## MY (MONTHLY) WORD!

# "The Shenandoah Kid Rides Again!" (An Introduction)

A preface...something you already know:

The Shenandoah Valley lies between two mountain ranges, the Appalachian on the west and the Blue Ridge on the east. Interstate 81 runs from the bottom of the valley to the top. It's a beautiful part of America. In Autumn the gold, red and yellow leaves give a sun-like glow to the Valley; in Spring I was reminded of these words from a Classical Reform Passover song which came to life,

"Behold it is the springtide of the year, over and past is winter's gloomy reign, the happy sound of singing birds is here, and clad in bud and bloom are hill and plain."

In 1970 when my wife Suzy and I were in Jerusalem soon to complete my third year of rabbinical school, I learned that my first student pulpit would be in Harrisonburg, Virginia. I knew hardly a thing about Virginia, let alone a Harrisonburg, Virginia! So as a 23 year-old student anticipating his first rabbinic experience I was both excited and very nervous.

Every other weekend I would fly from Cincinnati to Roanoke and then drive to the congregation. I could deal with the beauty of Spring's budding flowers but Autumn's majesty took my breath away. As a matter of fact, I would ask my passenger, the student rabbi in Staunton who I dropped off on Friday and picked up on Sunday, to get behind the wheel as I could not keep my eyes on the road; the colors were overwhelming.

On the other hand, I don't have to tell you that Winter's snow can be rough. On one January day while we were already in the air the Roanoke airport closed; our flight was detoured to Lynchburg. The storm quickly moved in that direction and we had to drive down the mountain in a veritable blizzard! I could barely see ahead of me. While we were driving my colleague stuck his body out of the window and used a scraper to do what the windshield wipers could barely do. Baruch haShem, Thank the Eternal that we made it to both Staunton and then I to Harrisonburg.

I also want to remind you that it was Madison *College* in those years. Suzy and I would visit with Ann Mintzer just about every summer as we headed to our retreat center in North Carolina. Were we surprised when we saw how the "College" grew. My very first response the first time I saw James Madison

University, "My God, it used to be so small they couldn't even fit in the name 'James'"!

My two years in Beth El Congregation would turn out to be very important in my future rabbinic career. As Ruth Clayman, *z"l*, your religious school director of yore, told everyone she met from Wilmington's Congregation Beth Emeth, *"I trained him well!"* She was right. I served that congregation for thirty-seven years and I thanked God for Ruth's mentoring in my many connections to our religious school.

In the ten years since my retirement - in addition to teaching, counseling, writing and traveling - I spent two years as interim rabbi in Winchester, Virginia, and this year in Staunton. With all the rest stops of I-81 firmly implanted in my mind, I've referred to myself as *The Shenandoah Kid*.

Recently the words of the adage came to mind... "What goes around comes around," as once again I will be with you, not as your student rabbi but, shall we say, as your "seasoned" rabbi.

So during the Hebrew year of 5780 I will be celebrating *FIFTY* years since I began my congregational rabbinate...and Beth El started it all!

Thank you for those special years of 1970-1972...and I truly look forward to "beginning" with you in September.

As a committee member, I believe I can say that one of our goals has been to inform the Beth El community about events and activities which are possible options for individuals to support and become involved in.

Whether addressing the Harrisonburg/Rockingham County area, Virginia, the U.S., or our global community, there is no lack of organizations and issues to learn about, support and/or engage with. 'Tikkun Olam': repair of the human and nonhuman components of the world, "human responsibility for fixing what is wrong with the world." Most recently Andy and I attended the annual NAACP Juneteenth Celebration, commemorating the freeing of the last remaining enslaved people in Texas on June 19, 1865. This took place at Wildwood Park in Bridgewater. Earlier in the month, I attended a local VA ACLU information forum, a monthly Interfaith Association Meeting, and a Faith in Action (FIA) celebration of the criminal justice work accomplished during the past year. You may once again be asked what social justice issues are important to you. FIA will be gathering input for next year's goals and commitments.

For future consideration, think about a project that extends into and across the various sub-groups of the congregation: Religious School students, Religious School parents, Mens' Club, Sisterhood, and SHORTY youth group members....
