## A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT, From the Board 10/21/19

- The year is underway. Many commented that the holidays went well with good attendance. Josh Linder shared that those attending the Family service at Rosh Hashanah enjoyed the event immensely. Thanks to Rabbi Grumbacher for making this happen. Many congregants voiced appreciation that the HPD were visual and supplemented by increased patrols as needed. We continue to have a number of activities in the future and will request additional patrols when indicated.
- Josh Linder (also JMU Hillel advisor) reported about the upcoming Beth El Kulanu event co-sponsored by Hillel. Eric Kramer is the primary liaison for this event during the weekend of November 15.
- Hannah Kaufman, a Hillel member and vice president of Sigma Alpha Epsilon Pi attended to continue our
  dialogue about how to encourage involvement with Jewish students from JMU at Beth El. Other ways
  that we could incorporate the student Jewish community with Beth El include participating in our Purim
  celebration, hosting a pizza Shabbat evening, assisting with leading a lay service, working in our gardens,
  and helping with Pizza Bingo and corned beef sales. In addition, we suggested that Sorority events could
  be held at Beth El as long as building use requirements were met.
- Building and Grounds: Ron Ornstein reported that a lot of work has been done on the outside grounds by Mary Handley and Clarence Ashburn. Ron proposed that we consider giving Clarence and Barbara Ashburn a raise since they have been consistently working to help us, above our expectations. He proposed that we give them a \$50 per month raise to start November 1, 2019. The board voted in favor of the proposal.
- Rabbi Search committee: Andy Kohen stated that the committee elected to continue to search for a fulltime rabbi, without partnerships with other synagogues, although this avenue of partnership was explored. As a growing community we hope a full time rabbi is a viable option.
- Social Action: The focus of Faith in Action will be on affordable housing which was in line with the input given by Beth El congregants. A number of our congregants attended the Valley Pride Day. Becky Mintzer and Michelle participated in the Greater Shenandoah Valley Out of Darkness Walk.
- As a point of information, Andy has been in contact with Lindsey Noble who will continue to manage the Beth El Website (although she lives in Israel<sup>©</sup>.) Thank you Lindsey!
- Men's Club: Les reports that they are hosting the Lions Club on November 12. They had good attendance at their last meeting.
- Sisterhood: Sherri reports that they met on 10/22 and are planning the chili cook-off on 11/03/19. Their recent fundraiser went well. Margee will be sending out an email to encourage others to host an Oneg. Several members will be traveling to Wilmington, Delaware for a regional meeting. The Sisterhood will be making a donation to the Blue Ridge Food Bank in honor of the religious school.
- Religious school: Alef is learning about mitzvot; Bet about holidays; Gimel about haftorah parshas, and Dalet about life cycles, in addition to studying Hebrew and prayers at their appropriate level. We have been making use of the kitchenware for our weekly snack. The students have gotten familiar with bringing dishes over to the sink, and it appears to have cut down greatly on waste.
- SHORTY: Will go to the pumpkin patch on 10/26, and they are going to the Alzheimer's Walk 11/02.
- Security update: Finalization of recommendations are in place, including an estimate from B.C. Lox &
  Keys. Eric Rynar detailed the security proposal, including door-locking options. We are comparing our
  options for the required work.
- We are revisiting building use by-laws to address a request to use the social hall. The board supports low maintenance usage, but additional information is needed.
- We discussed current Bar/Bat Mitzvah dynamics, including the Beth El guidelines and expectations.

- Religious School reports that Jackson Moyer celebrates his Bar Mitzvah next month in Aruba.
- We need to think about transitions in responsibility and leadership. Michelle is collecting information that may be helpful. (No, the etrog & lulav do not magically appear.)

## MY (MONTHLY) WORD!

## "Gratitude is an Attitude!"

Rosh Hashanah is called "The Birthday of the World" which was the theme of my holy day Family service. I suggested the kids give gifts to the world for the occasion. We had a six-foot box all wrapped up in birthday paper into which their gifts could be placed...symbolically, of course...and we spoke about why each gift was so important (and let me say "Thank You!" to all in the religious school who worked together to create this birthday present).

As part of my lesson I mentioned that if it was at all possible the world would say "Thank You" to each of the boys and girls. I also said that the appropriate response is "You're Welcome!" It is **not** "No Worries" or "No Problem."

Truth be told, it drives me nuts when I hear anyone say anything other than "You're Welcome!" It is so rare for guests on radio or television programs to respond appropriately when they are thanked for appearing. "You're Welcome!" implies that it was the person's pleasure and shows a bit of humility; as I see it, those other responses imply, "You kept me from something more important, but in my overwhelming goodness I chose you." What's worse is that they probably don't even mean that; they are merely phrases with little behind them. Of course that's my humble opinion.

Gratitude is an attitude.

Nowadays many don't say "Thank You!" because too many feel entitiled; even our children or grandchildren don't say "Thank You!" as they should, and if they deign to do so it's via email or text. Yes, I know, that's the way of the world, but a phone call or handwritten note has a bit more appreciation behind the gesture.

We celebrate Thanksgiving this month. Many don't realize that our festival of Succot was the basis for this American holiday. The early settlers were versed in

\*\*"Old Testament"\*\* values based on Israelite holidays. The point is that our ancestors were very grateful for the Divine protection they were afforded in their long trek through the wilderness before arriving in the Promised Land, and they were thankful for the richness of the harvest.

How many gifts we take for granted, those from God or those from others! As I once mentioned (maybe more than once, in fact), when we welcome the Messianic Age, all worship ends, but we must still recite the prayer of thanksgiving to show our appreciation for the bounty we have received.

May your Thanksgiving be a rich one. May the Divine blessings we have received be appreciated. May that appreciation be recognized by a hearty "Thank You!" as we dig into our turkey.

\*\*Jews say "Torah" if it's only the Five Books of Moses. It's *Tanakh*, if it's Torah as well as the Prophets and Writings..."T" = *Torah*; "N"= *Nevi'im* or Prophets; "Kh" = *Ketuvim* or Writings such as, for example, Psalms and Proverbs. We tend not to use Old Testament, because it implies there is a "New" one that has replaced Hebrew Scriptures.\*\*
