A Message from our Rabbi

Jewish Thanksgiving

If you ask most Jews "what is the most fun, joyous holiday of the year," they would likely assert, "Hanukkah," with the lighting of the Hanukkah candles, eating of jelly doughnuts and potato latkes (it's a mitzvah to ignore the Keto diet on Hanukkah) and, of course, presents. Some would say Purim, which celebrates with a revelry that mimics Purim or Mardi Gras. Some would say Passover, with the unique rituals surrounding the dramatic reenactment of our achievement of freedom around the family table.

When asked, how many people do you think would exclaim, "Sukkoth!"?
Sukkoth is the one holiday during the year known in Jewish tradition as the holiday of "rejoicing." A special prayer in the Amida states that Sukkoth is

"zman simchateinu" – "it is the time we rejoice!"

Why would that be? The answer can be found in the Torah, in Deuteronomy 16:13-14, which states:

You shall observe the Feast of Booths seven days, after you have gathered in your grain and your wine; And you shall rejoice in your feast, you, and your son, and your daughter, your servants and the Levite and the stranger who are inside your gates.

The Torah clearly states that the Holiday of Sukkoth is a holiday of rejoicing, of festivity, of happiness. It should be a time of rejoicing for everyone – reread the passage above from the Torah – it applies to master and servant, the priests and the strangers among us.

In the Torah, Sukkoth was the definitive pilgrimage festival.

Occurring right before the winter it represented the most important of the harvests. A successful fall harvest enhanced the chances of one prospering during the cold winter

months. It became a time of celebration – for oneself, one's servants, for the priests, the strangers, the widows and orphans. It is the time when we pick our own pears and apples from our trees on the synagogue property! It was truly a holiday of thanksgiving, much like our own American holiday in which the pilgrims and indigenous peoples together celebrated a bountiful harvest in advance of the long, cold New England winter.

So the next time someone asks you what is the most fun of the Jewish holidays, and you begin thinking of Hanukkah, and then Passover, and then Purim, you may also think about the Torah and Jewish tradition and remember that for our ancestors, the greatest time of rejoicing was the fall holiday of Sukkoth, celebrating the joy our ancestors felt at recalling the hard times of wandering through the desert while they brought fruits of their successful harvest in their own land to Jerusalem.
