Hag Leyl Kol Hakedoshim Sameakh By Rabbi Jeff Kurtz-Lendner

The title of this article is "Happy Halloween," in Hebrew! Literally it translates to "Happy Eve of all the Holy Ones," in other words, the night before All Saints Day, or "All Hallows Eve." Growing up in religious school we were taught that Halloween was not a Jewish holiday and Jews shouldn't observe it. I don't know ANYONE in my religious school who followed that dictum. Many say it's based on the Christian observance of preparing for All Saints Day, which is the day of the year on the Catholic calendar when every saint is honored at once. Actually, that observance of Halloween was a co-opted holiday from natural religions (often referred to as "pagan.") In natural religious observances, it was the day to purge oneself from the demons in one's life.

Regardless of whether the American version of Halloween was adapted from Christianity or from natural religions, the argument would still be made that Halloween is derived from a religious holiday from outside of Judaism. Hence the prohibition would remain.

So why the Hebrew title? Well, this is indeed what the holiday is called in Israel. Although it is not a recognized holiday on the Israeli calendar, nevertheless there are Israeli celebrations of the holiday throughout the country. Especially in, of course, Tel Aviv! You can find clubs, bars and restaurants in Tel Aviv adorned with Halloween decorations. In recent years, schools, community centers and amusement parks have begun to embrace the decorations with family events. And while trick or treating is not prevalent in Israel, they still have parties with pumpkins, costumes and trick or treat like experiences. Maybe in Israel the common candy given out is Halvah or Elite chocolate!

Whatever religious connotations Halloween may have had, today the way we observe Halloween has nothing at all to do with religious customs. Today it is a fun and silly

holiday. The biggest challenge we have is not protecting our children from the outside influences of an "alien religion" on Jewish practice, but instead, making sure our children don't make themselves ill or get cavities. Sweets are great! Too much sweets, well maybe not so much.

For those of you observing Halloween, I wish you a "leyl kol hakedoshim sameakh!"
