A Message from our Rabbi

Religious People Helping Each Other Observe Religion

Some years back I was regularly patronizing a local restaurant. The restaurant was a franchise and its product selection is governed by the rules of the franchise.

Over the years I became acquainted with the restaurant's owners and family and they knew that I was the rabbi at the Temple down the street. Sometimes we shared stories about our communities. I learned that the restaurant's owners were Muslim.

One day I went in and the owner's daughter, who also worked in the restaurant, discovered that some of the products have minor ingredients which are derivatives of pork. One would not be able to determine this simply by reading the ingredient list. This employee/daughter was so excited to share this information with people who are concerned.

She knew that Judaism and Islam are different; yet here is a basic commonality we share, one where the dictates of both of our religions are the same. This member of the Muslim community was obviously concerned that Muslims might be inadvertently violating their own religion and she shared this information with other Muslims to help them observe their faith properly. And she decided that she should share it with a Jew for whom she knew observing those traditions was important. She decided to help both Muslims and Jews to observe their faiths properly.

It reminded me of a story from the old south. There is a legend (true or not I don't know) that's told about when European Jews first began settling in the United States. Sometimes there might have been only one or two Jewish families in some of these small southern towns. Often Jews in early American history settled these towns in search of a livelihood and often set up general stores to supply the farmers, manufacturers and explorers as our nation was developed.

So the story is told of a shop-owner being the only Jewish family in town. One year the most important Jewish holy day, Yom Kippur, fell on a Saturday. The store's owner decided to keep the store open that day because Saturdays were the most important day of business for the residents of the town. He felt that closing the store would have been a hardship for the town's residents. Well, about a week before Yom Kippur the town council sent over its leaders to visit the store's owner, and said to him, "Listen. We are a very religious community here. We all go to church and we worship piously. You are Jewish. Your religion demands that you close your store on Saturday. As a religious town we are telling you that you have to observe your religion and close your store for your holy day."

What a profound story – people so dedicated to their own religious observance that it becomes important to them that someone else observes HIS religion in accordance with HIS faith even though those rituals have nothing to do with their own religion.

I don't know if this story is true but it certainly teaches us all an important value. This is what religious cooperation is all about. We may have different traditions, different customs and different theological views, but a basic respect for religion understands that we respect people of different faiths and help THEM worship God, observe their faith and be true to their heritage as a value of our own religion. If religious people

from all over the world were to help each other be true to their faiths and respect those different customs and traditions then we could truly remove so much of the conflict that divides people.

And thank you, to the Muslim shop owner, who helped a rabbi observe his Jewish traditions.
